

REGULAR MEETING, SEPTEMBER 17, 2013: The regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Morgantown was held in the Council Chambers of City Hall on Tuesday, September 17, 2013 at 7:00 P.M.

PRESENT: City Manager Jeff Mikorski, Assistant City Manager of Operations Glen Kelly, City Attorney Steve Fanok, City Clerk Linda Little, Mayor Jenny Selin and Council Members: Ron Bane, Bill Kaweck, Wes Nugent, Marti Shamberger, Mike Fike and Nancy Ganz.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES: The minutes of the Regular and Special Meetings of September 3, 2013 were approved as presented.

CORRESPONDENCE: Councilor Nugent brought forward traffic issues brought to him. Citizens urged the placement of a one way sign at the intersection of Spruce and Forest, and asked for a four-way stop at the intersection of High and Foundry.

PUBLIC HEARING – AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 333.03 OF THE MORGANTOWN TRAFFIC CODE PROVIDING IMPLIED CONSENT TO TEST FOR CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES OR DRUGS; REMOVING URINE AS A SUBJECT OF TESTING TO DETERMINE ITS ALCOHOL CONTENT OR CONCENTRATION, OR ITS CONTROLLED SUBSTANCE OR DRUG CONTENT; AND SPECIFYING WHERE TESTING CAN BE DONE.

There being no appearances, Mayor Selin declared the public hearing closed.

PUBLIC HEARING – AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 333.04 OF THE MORGANTOWN TRAFFIC CODE FOR THE INTERPRETATION AND USE OF CHEMICAL TESTS FOR ARRESTS FOR DRIVING A MOTOR VEHICLE UNDER THE INFLUENCE OF ALCOHOL, CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES OR DRUGS.

There being no appearances, Mayor Selin declared the public hearing closed.

PUBLIC HEARING – AN ORDINANCE BY THE CITY OF MORGANTOWN AMENDING SECTION 905.02 OF ITS STREETS, UTILITIES AND PUBLIC SERVICES CODE BY ADDING A NEW SUBSECTION (d) THERETO ADDRESSING THE SALE OF MERCHANDISE UPON SIDEWALKS OF THE CITY.

Joseph Byrd, owner of a hot dog stand on High Street, states that he has been selling hot dogs in an area designated to him for the past eight years. He reported going to the police with the downtown behavior problems of students which affected his business. He feels that placing all the vendors in the same area undercuts free enterprise and hurts business. States that he is part of the solution and is not causing the problems downtown and that it is not fair to make him move his business.

Joe Stone, owner of Hot Dog Man stand. He stated he has been in business since 1988. He agreed with Mr. Byrd that it is not fair for the vendors to operate next to one another. He indicated that operating in the street or a parking space will be a safety hazard. He is not averse to renting a spot, as long as the price is reasonable. Grouping the vendors will cause a large crowd of drunken students.

Ray Glymph, owner of the Morgantown Taco Truck as well as a brick & mortar business. He addressed suggestions made by the Main Street president for vendor regulations and asked if they will be enforced for brick & mortar owners as well. He agreed with other speakers that grouping vendors cuts their competitive edge. He shared research from other cities about how vendors are regulated. He stated that the proposed Ordinances only benefit brick & mortar businesses. He presented pictures to Council of

foot traffic downtown and also stated that there are only three downtown food vendors and these three people cannot possibly be the cause of downtown congestion and problems.

Chris Grand, 430 Brockway Avenue, suggested that the raised curbs around trees on downtown sidewalks narrow the walk way and cause obstructions that trip people. He suggested that the problem of sidewalk congestion is structural and not to do with the vendors.

Bobbi McCollum, co-owner of the Taco Truck spoke of all the good that food vendors do and dispelled the complaints of the brick and mortar owners. She does not believe that three vendors are not the cause of the downtown congestion, violence and problems. She reported vendors always sweep trash, even trash that is not theirs. They abide by all health inspections and laws. She stated that only one Council member has gone downtown to see what actually occurs.

Colin Wood, WVU law student, represented students who stand by the vendors. He stated that the proposed Ordinances are an injustice to the vendors and will only serve to take their livelihoods. He urged Council not to pass the Ordinances.

Tyler George, 88 Marion Street, business owner in Morgantown, recalled many vendors over the years. He feels that the vendors provide an invaluable service in calming bar patrons on the streets by providing them food, which helps ease situations involving drunk persons.

George Papandreas, President of Main Street Morgantown, addressed comments made about his suggestions to Council with regard to the vendor situation. He stated that he intended to organize a food truck rally. He clarified that Main Street was asked to provide research about vendor situations in other cities, and that no recommendations were made. He stated that he is in favor of the proposed Ordinances as they reflect the best practices of other cities across the nation. He is pro-vendor and appreciates their presence on the streets downtown. He noted that problems can occur when a vendor sets up shop directly in front of an open brick & mortar business, and that can cause congestion.

Mike Shuman, 260 High Street, business owner, agreed that when vendors set up directly in front of a bar's exit, it does cause congestion which leads to fights. It is also a fire hazard. He reported several different types and numbers of vendors frequenting downtown over the years.

Joe Horvatt, 376 High Street, downtown business owner, suggested that the three main vendors could be grandfathered into their locations, especially if they are not setting up directly in front of another business or causing any of the problems being discussed.

There being no other appearances, Mayor Selin declared the public hearing closed.

PUBLIC HEARING – AN ORDINANCE BY THE CITY OF MORGANTOWN AMENDING SECTION 361.09 OF ITS TRAFFIC CODE, AS THE SAME APPLIES TO PUBLIC PARKING SPACES AND THE SAME OF MERCHANDISE IN THE DOWNTOWN BUSINESS DISTRICT OF THE CITY.

Matthew Held, Kingwood Street, a citizen who offered his view on the downtown issue, stating the Ordinance was over-reaching and that brick & mortar businesses do not compare to food truck vendors.

Mr. Byrd spoke again, as above, stating that he would not oppose being grandfathered and assured that he does not locate in an area of congestion or near the entrance of businesses. He is not against businesses and will help them, and anyone he can.

Mr. Stone, spoke again as above, stating he will comply with safety and fire hazard regulations as he has done in the past. He stated he is concerned for the safety involved with operating his vendor stand from a parking space.

Mr. Kramer, student residing on East St. John Street, offered the differences between brick & mortar and vendor businesses. He stated the food carts are a better offer for student to save money on the cost of a meal. He feels the Ordinances will not fix the problem.

There being no other appearances, Mayor Selin declared the public hearing closed.

There being no appearances, Mayor Selin declared the public hearing closed.

PUBLIC HEARING – AN ORDINANCE VACATING ABANDONING AND ANNULLING AN APPROXIMATE 13’ WIDE UNNAMED RIGHT-OF-WAY EXTENDING AND RUNNING A DISTANCE OF APPROXIMATELY TWO HUNDRED AND SIXTY SEVEN FEET FROM OAKLAND STREET TO HARDING AVENUE, IN THE SEVENTH WARD OF THE CITY OF MORGANTOWN, MONONGALIA COUNTY, WEST VIRGINIA, NOT USED NOR USEFUL FOR STREET PURPOSES.

There being no appearances, Mayor Selin declared the public hearing closed.

PUBLIC HEARING – AN ORDINANCE VACATING ABANDONING AND ANNULLING AN APPROXIMATE 40’ WIDE RIGHT-OF-WAY KNOWN AS ST. JOSEPH STREET, EXTENDING AND RUNNING A DISTANCE OF APPROXIMATELY THREE HUNDRED AND TEN FEET FROM OAKLAND STREET TO HARDING AVENUE, IN THE SEVENTH WARD OF THE CITY OF MORGANTOWN, MONONGALIA COUNTY, WEST VIRGINIA, NOT USED NOR USEFUL FOR STREET PURPOSES.

There being no appearances, Mayor Selin declared the public hearing closed.

PUBLIC HEARING – AN ORDINANCE VACATING ABANDONING AND ANNULLING AN APPROXIMATE 40’ WIDE RIGHT-OF-WAY KNOWN AS HARDING AVENUE EXTENSION, EXTENDING AND RUNNING A DISTANCE OF APPROXIMATELY ONE HUNDRED AND SEVENTEEN FEET TO REALTY OWNED BY THE WEST VIRGINIA UNIVERSITY BOARD OF GOVERNORS FROM THE INTERSECTION OF COUNTRY CLUB DRIVE AND HARDING AVENUE IN THE SEVENTH WARD OF THE CITY OF MORGANTOWN, MONONGALIA COUNTY, WEST VIRGINIA, NOT USED NOR USEFUL FOR STREET PURPOSES.

There being no appearances, Mayor Selin declared the public hearing closed.

PUBLIC HEARING – AN ORDINANCE BY THE CITY OF MORGANTOWN VACATING, ABANDONING AND ANNULLING PARTS OR PORTIONS OF COUNTRY CLUB DRIVE AND ACCEPTING THE DEDICATION OF ADDITIONS TO COUNTRY CLUB DRIVE, LOCATED AND SITUATE IN THE SEVENTH WARD OF THE CITY OF MORGANTOWN,

MONONGALIA COUNTY, WEST VIRGINIA, IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE PARTIAL REALIGNMENT AND RELOCATION OF COUNTRY CLUB DRIVE.

There being no appearances, Mayor Selin declared the public hearing closed.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE TRAFFIC CODE, IMPLIED CONSENT FOR DRUGS OR ALCOHOL TESTING: The below entitled Ordinance was presented for second reading:

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 333.03 OF THE MORGANTOWN TRAFFIC CODE PROVIDING IMPLIED CONSENT TO TEST FOR CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES OR DRUGS; REMOVING URINE AS A SUBJECT OF TESTING TO DETERMINE ITS ALCOHOL CONTENT OR CONCENTRATION, OR ITS CONTROLLED SUBSTANCE OR DRUG CONTENT; AND SPECIFYING WHERE TESTING CAN BE DONE.

Motion by Shamberger, second by Ganz to adopt the above entitled Ordinance. Motion carried 7-0.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE TRAFFIC CODE, CHEMICAL TESTS FOR DUI ARRESTS: The below entitled Ordinance was presented for second reading:

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 333.04 OF THE MORGANTOWN TRAFFIC CODE FOR THE INTERPRETATION AND USE OF CHEMICAL TESTS FOR ARRESTS FOR DRIVING A MOTOR VEHICLE UNDER THE INFLUENCE OF ALCOHOL, CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES OR DRUGS.

Motion by Ganz, second by Shamberger to adopt the above entitled Ordinance. After explanation, motion carried 7-0.

AN ORDINANCE ADDRESSING THE SALE OF MERCHANDISE UPON SIDEWALKS OF THE CITY: The below entitled Ordinance was presented for second reading:

AN ORDINANCE BY THE CITY OF MORGANTOWN AMENDING SECTION 905.02 OF ITS STREETS, UTILITIES AND PUBLIC SERVICES CODE BY ADDING A NEW SUBSECTION (d) THERETO ADDRESSING THE SALE OF MERCHANDISE UPON SIDEWALKS OF THE CITY.

Motion by Kawecky, second by Fike to adopt the above entitled Ordinance. City Manager Jeff Mikorski stated that the Ordinances are the latest of changes being made to improve safety and mitigate congestion in the downtown area at night. After discussion among Council, the question was called. Motion carried 5-2. Councilor Bane and Mayor Selin voted NO.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING TRAFFIC CODE, SALE OF MERCHANDISE IN DOWNTOWN PARKING SPACES: The below entitled Ordinance was presented for second reading:

AN ORDINANCE BY THE CITY OF MORGANTOWN AMENDING SECTION 361.09 OF ITS TRAFFIC CODE, AS THE SAME APPLIES TO PUBLIC PARKING SPACES AND THE SAME OF MERCHANDISE IN THE DOWNTOWN BUSINESS DISTRICT OF THE CITY.

Motion by Kawecky, second by Fike to adopt the above entitled Ordinance. Immediately, Motion for a minor amendment by Nugent, second by Kawecky to include the inadvertently omitted underlining

of the words "food goods, wares or other" in the ordinance as presented before Council. Motion on the minor amendment carried 6-1. Councilor Bane voted NO.

There began discussion on the main motion, which lead to a discussion of the possibility to reconsider the vote on the previous Ordinance, addressing sale of merchandise on sidewalks. Discussion continued until a motion by Ganz, second by Bane to table the above entitled Ordinance. Motion to table carried 6-1, Councilor Kawecki voted NO.

Then a motion by Nugent, second by Bane to reconsider the adoption of the previous Ordinance, amending section 905.02 of the Streets, Utilities and Public Services Code, to address the sale of merchandise upon sidewalks. After discussion, the motion to reconsider was amended by Nugent, second by Bane, making the effective date of the Ordinance January 1st 2014. Motion carried 7-0.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING AN AGREEMENT FOR DEP ACCESS TO AIRPORT REALTY: The below entitled Ordinance was presented for second reading:

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF AN INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT BY AND BETWEEN THE CITY AND THE STATE OF WEST VIRGINIA DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION (DEP) WHEREBY DEP MAY ENTER UPON MUNICIPAL AIRPORT REALTY TO DETERMINE THE POSSIBLE EXISTENCE OF ADVERSE COAL MINING PRACTICES, AND TO ALSO DETERMINE THE FEASIBILITY OF CONTROL OF ANY SUCH ADVERSE COAL MINING PRACTICES.

Motion by Bane, second by Ganz to adopt the above entitled Ordinance.

Councilor Fike then raised a Point of Information, asking for clarification on the action Council previously took with regard to the downtown food vendor Ordinances. Council discussed and reviewed the action they took, and it was stated that the effective date of the first Ordinance was changed in order to allow further amendments to the Ordinance until such date; and the second Ordinance was tabled until further notice.

Returning to the main motion, the question was called and motion carried 7-0.

AN ORDINANCE ANNULING A 13' WIDE UNNAMED RIGHT-OF-WAY IN THE SEVENTH WARD: The below entitled Ordinance was presented for second reading:

AN ORDINANCE VACATING ABANDONING AND ANNULING AN APPROXIMATE 13' WIDE UNNAMED RIGHT-OF-WAY EXTENDING AND RUNNING A DISTANCE OF APPROXIMATELY TWO HUNDRED AND SIXTY SEVEN FEET FROM OAKLAND STREET TO HARDING AVENUE, IN THE SEVENTH WARD OF THE CITY OF MORGANTOWN, MONONGALIA COUNTY, WEST VIRGINIA, NOT USED NOR USEFUL FOR STREET PURPOSES.

Motion by Ganz to table the above entitled Ordinance. After discussion, and explanation from the City Attorney, motion to table failed for lack of a second.

Motion by Nugent, second by Bane to adopt the above entitled Ordinance. After a statement from Councilor Ganz and subsequent discussion, the question was called and the main motion carried 6-1. Councilor Ganz voted NO.

AN ORDINANCE ANNULING ST. JOSEPH STREET IN THE SEVENTH WARD: The below entitled Ordinance was presented for second reading:

AN ORDINANCE VACATING ABANDONING AND ANNULLING AN APPROXIMATE 40' WIDE RIGHT-OF-WAY KNOWN AS ST. JOSEPH STREET, EXTENDING AND RUNNING A DISTANCE OF APPROXIMATELY THREE HUNDRED AND TEN FEET FROM OAKLAND STREET TO HARDING AVENUE, IN THE SEVENTH WARD OF THE CITY OF MORGANTOWN, MONONGALIA COUNTY, WEST VIRGINIA, NOT USED NOR USEFUL FOR STREET PURPOSES.

Motion by Bane, second by Nugent to adopt the above entitled Ordinance. After a comment from Mayor Selin, motion carried 6-1. Councilor Ganz voted NO.

AN ORDINANCE ANNULLING HARDING AVENUE EXTENSION IN THE SEVENTH WARD: The below entitled Ordinance was presented for second reading:

AN ORDINANCE VACATING ABANDONING AND ANNULLING AN APPROXIMATE 40' WIDE RIGHT-OF-WAY KNOWN AS HARDING AVENUE EXTENSION, EXTENDING AND RUNNING A DISTANCE OF APPROXIMATELY ONE HUNDRED AND SEVENTEEN FEET TO REALTY OWNED BY THE WEST VIRGINIA UNIVERSITY BOARD OF GOVERNORS FROM THE INTERSECTION OF COUNTRY CLUB DRIVE AND HARDING AVENUE IN THE SEVENTH WARD OF THE CITY OF MORGANTOWN, MONONGALIA COUNTY, WEST VIRGINIA, NOT USED NOR USEFUL FOR STREET PURPOSES.

Motion by Bane, second by Shamberger to adopt the above entitled Ordinance. After a comment by Councilor Ganz, Point of Order by Councilor Bane, Council is not to address, or speak personally about, one another during debate. The Question was called and motion carried 6-1, Councilor Ganz voted NO.

AN ORDINANCE ANNULLING PORTIONS OF, AND ACCEPTING ADDITIONS TO, COUNTRY CLUB DRIVE IN THE SEVENTH WARD: The below entitled Ordinance was presented for second reading:

AN ORDINANCE BY THE CITY OF MORGANTOWN VACATING, ABANDONING AND ANNULLING PARTS OR PORTIONS OF COUNTRY CLUB DRIVE AND ACCEPTING THE DEDICATION OF ADDITIONS TO COUNTRY CLUB DRIVE, LOCATED AND SITUATE IN THE SEVENTH WARD OF THE CITY OF MORGANTOWN, MONONGALIA COUNTY, WEST VIRGINIA, IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE PARTIAL REALIGNMENT AND RELOCATION OF COUNTRY CLUB DRIVE.

Motion by Shamberger, second by Bane to adopt the above entitled Ordinance. After statements from Councilor Nugent, and Mayor Selin, the question was called. Motion carried 6-1, Councilor Ganz voted NO

BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS: Ms. Little noted that the BOPARC board opening will be interviewed during an upcoming special meeting, and the Personnel board opening is still receiving applicants. Council then appointed Robert Jones to the Traffic Commission by acclamation.

Ms. Little then advised Council they need to discuss how the formation of the new Woodburn School Commission is to take place. It was suggested that applicants be sought through advertisement rather than recruitment. By consensus of Council, the topic shall be discussed further at the Committee of the Whole.

Ms. Little then updated Council about the upcoming BZA and Planning Commission advertisements and interviews, which take place in accordance with state law.

PUBLIC PORTION:

Chris Grant, 430 Brockway Avenue, suggested that the City extend the handle of the downtown trash compactors by adding a pull cord, so that citizens would not get their hands dirty while touching handle; which is positioned so close to the opening that it is often covered in residue. He feels that if this sanitary consideration were addressed, that people would use the compactors more often.

Matthew Held, Kingwood Street, noted that the discussion on the Ordinances was confusing, he feels that if there are rules and regulations that are not written down, they will cause confusion.

There being no other appearances, Mayor Selin declared the public portion closed.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE REPORTS: No reports.

CITY MANAGERS REPORT:

Spoke on the vendor Ordinances, stating that he will address all safety concerns that Council has, he stated that Rules and Regulations will be developed alongside the Ordinances as well.

INFORMATION:

1. High Street Streetscape Complete

Mr. Mikorski announced the completion of the project, and noted that High Street will be paved in its entirety in the near future.

NEW BUSINESS:

1. FY13 Annual Report of Police and Fire Pension Funds

After explanation, motion by Bane, second by Ganz to accept the report of the funds as presented. Motion carried 7-0.

2. Morgantown Human Rights Commission Requests

After explanation, Motion by Kaweck, second by Ganz to approve of the HRC logo and the inclusion of an ex-officio member from the State HRC. After discussion, motion carried 7-0.

3. Brand Development Opportunity for the City of Morgantown

After explanation, Motion by Nugent, second by Shamberger to initiate the brand development process and budget \$9,500 for the program. After discussion, motion carried 7-0.

Mr. Mikorski then updated Council that he is continuing to work with WVU on the effects of their smoking band, and they have placed signs in areas abutting private property reminding smokers to be respectful.

REPORT FROM CITY CLERK: Ms. Little sought Council's direction in inviting State Representatives to the City's annual legislative priorities meeting, and so received their consensus to proceed as indicated. She also thanked Mr. Frank Scafella for taking the most recent Council portrait.

REPORT FROM CITY ATTORNEY: No Report

REPORT FROM COUNCIL MEMBERS:

Councilor Bane: Councilor Bane thanked Mr. Mikorski and the Department Heads who joined him on his ward tour last week.

Councilor Kawecki: Councilor Kawecki reminded staff when his ward tour will begin later in the week, he also announced the South Park block party.

Councilor Nugent: Councilor Nugent announced the upcoming Wiles Hill-Highland Park neighborhood meet and greet event. He discussed the Business 101 program and invited Council to participate, and asked that discussion of the topic be placed on an upcoming Committee of the Whole. Council then did give its consensus. He also noted that it should be continued that Council ask for agenda items in a public and open fashion to maintain transparency.

Councilor Shamberger: Councilor Shamberger commended the City for advertising unclaimed property. She announced the MHS Band Spectacular and the Chinese Student Association of WVU's Autumn Festival. She stated that the Ice Rink is now open, mentioned a production at the Met Theatre, and gave her condolences to a person struck and killed by a vehicle on Patteson Drive recently.

Councilor Fike: Councilor Fike echoed the concerns of Councilor Shamberger, stating that recent pedestrian deaths in the community shed a light on safety concerns. He looked for recommendations to come from the Pedestrian Safety Board and Traffic Commission as they examine these tragedies. He will discuss this at the upcoming Community Leadership Forum as it is a regional safety issue. He also relayed a request from the Pedestrian Safety Board, to make a presentation at the October Committee of the Whole. Council then did give its consensus. He noted he attended the Brownfields event, and relayed that AARP has announced three of the nation's top fifteen employers are located in Morgantown. Councilor Fike added that he enjoys his time participating with the Good Will ambassadors.

Councilor Ganz: Councilor Ganz announced the upcoming fundraiser for the Child Advocacy Center, and the Suncrest neighborhood association meeting. She noted that traffic concerns are important and encourages the discussion. She also stated that tree cozies are on display at the CAC.

Mayor Selin: Mayor Selin informed Council that a request has come through for a letter of support in renaming the South High Bridge for

John Pyles. She asked for Council's pleasure on the matter, to write such a letter or to discuss the issue further. Councilor Shamberger suggested the letter of support. Councilor Nugent asked for clarification on where the request came from, Mayor Selin replied that Delegate Fleischauer and Senator Beach requested the City write a letter of support because the matter has passed through the House and is now in the Senate. Councilor Nugent asked that the matter be discussed first to determine a future policy should the need to name a bridge arise again. Council then consented to move the matter to the Committee of the Whole.

Mayor Selin then asked if Council might entertain a presentation on safety or safe city designation in the near future. Councilor Kawecky then asked for clarification on the process for placing items on the Committee of the Whole agenda, and there was brief discussion on the matter.

Mayor Selin thanked Ron Justice and WVU for their work in accommodating citizens affected by the smoking policy. She then noted that newspapers are not listing meetings correctly. She then made several announcements for upcoming events including: Green Night at the Library, Mickey Hart Band at the Met Theatre, Bill Burr at the CAC, Poetry at the MAC, Parking Day, Josh Turner at the CAC, the ongoing Farmer's Market, Botanic Garden event, and the International Festival.

ADJOURNMENT: There being no further items of business or discussion, the meeting adjourned by unanimous consent at 9:50 p.m.
