

REGULAR MEETING August 18, 2015: The regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Morgantown was held in the Council Chambers of City Hall on Tuesday, August 18, 2015 at 7:03 p.m.

PRESENT: City Manager Jeff Mikorski, City Clerk Linda Tucker, Mayor Shamberger, City Attorney Ryan Simonton, Assistant City Manager Glen Kelly and Council Members: Ron Bane, Deputy Mayor Bill Kawecki, Wes Nugent, Jenny Selin, Jay Redmond, and Nancy Ganz.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Shamberger.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES: Minutes from the August 4th meeting were approved as printed.

CORRESPONDENCE: Council watched a 2 minute DVD of the CTA Special Needs Team competing in Columbus Ohio where they won the competition. Mayor Shamberger then presented a proclamation to them and certificates to special needs athletes and all coaches. Mayor Shamberger also presented an award to Glen Kelly from the West Virginia Municipal League "All Star Community Award" to display at the Morgantown Municipal Airport.

Dave Biafora, 6200 Mid-Atlantic Drive, questioned if the gift was from WVU or the Developer. From a conversation and knowledge, it seems like John Lynch and Mark Nesselroad bribed the City for a traffic light without a traffic study and seems as if the City Manager and Council are going to pass this Ordinance. Mr. Biafora acknowledged that the gift is more than they realize and that he is tracking this issue.

There being no other appearances, Mayor Shamberger declared the Public Hearing closed.

Mayor Shamberger declared this Public Hearing open.

Chris Haddox, 739 Monongalia Avenue, in Woodburn neighborhood, is here to speak in favor of the POPSHOPWV Lease arrangement. Chris is the Woodburn School Redevelopment Commission Chair that formed in 2013. Chris is thankful that Council supports the efforts to repurpose the property. Boys & Girls Club, Girls on the run, and POPSHOPWV are some of the tenants that are currently renting with several more available.

Tim Mashburn, 843 Ridgeway Avenue, Woodburn Commission, suggested Chris Russel, Owner of POPSHOPWV to get an agreement with the City at Woodburn and am in favor of this activity.

James Giuliani, 256 Prarie Avenue, he does not live in the Woodburn Neighborhood but is heavily invested because he feels like he is a part of it. He supports this and feels that this is a program that we need in this community to make it complete. He feels that we all need to reach out to everyone for help.

Randy Jones, 762 Spring Branch Road, commented that WVU students from service learning projects worked with POPSHOP volunteering 30-60 hours of their time. He mentioned that these students would be willing to volunteer in that capacity again, just contact him when Council is in need of volunteers.

There being no other appearances, Mayor Shamberger declared the Public Hearing closed.

PUBLIC PORTION:

Mayor Shamberger declared the Public Portion open.

Randy Jones, 762 Spring Branch Road, gave a follow-up on the students coming back and the service projects. He noted that there were 900 volunteers in the City and 23 pictures of graffiti that were sent to the City Manager. He stated that after meeting about with this year's project that next year Fallfest they will have a clean-up before and after. He then thanked the City Manager and Lyle Matthews for the vests and garbage bags in the helping in the Volunteer Service Project for the Fallfest.

Dave Biafora, 6200 Mid-Atlantic Drive, stated that the Harding Avenue and Country Club Road paving project is really a \$250,000 gift from Mark Nesselroad and John Lynch and noted that checking with the City Manager, Jeff Mikorski that Harding Avenue was not even on the paving list. He stated this is misuse of City funds and this Council and City Manager need to be very diligent and accurate with this agreement.

James Giuliani, 256 Prarie Drive, presented a hand out which was a letter from the City Manager dated August 5th, 2015 and commented that the letter was partial answers to the various questions that was requested from him and the City Attorney. Now I know why we need outside Counsel. He also stated that Council needs to outside Council needs to research the non-conforming use law. **(Exhibit A)**

There being no other appearances, Mayor Shamberger declared the public portion closed.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE REPORTS: City Manager, Jeff Mikorski, announced that the Bad Buildings Committee still needs volunteers. You may contact the City Manager's office for further information.

City Manager explained, after discussion, motion by Ganz, second by Selin, to pass the above entitled Ordinance to second reading. Motion carried 7-0.

CITY MANAGERS REPORT:

New Business:

1. Acid Mine Drainage Remediation Contract Award

As a part of the Airport access road on the east side of the airport property, an acid mine drainage remediation project was needed to remove acid mine drainage from impacting a creek. Department of Environmental Protection required the project. The City signed an agreement that the WVU Water Research Institute would be our sub-contractor to develop the design and administer the installation of the project. Within the budget of the road was budgeted \$200,000 for the project, with the Water Research Institute providing the remainder of the funds from other sources. The project was advertised and we received three bids, with the lowest bidder being All-Con, LLC for \$594,890.00. I recommend City Council awarding All-Con, LLC the contract for the above listed cost. As mentioned above, The WVU Water Research Institute will administer and inspect the installation of the facility.

After discussion, motion by Bane, second by Selin, to approve the bid for the Acid Mine Drainage Remediation to ALL-CON, LLC. For \$594,890. Motion carried 7-0.

2. Roads Paved From Past Years Funding

Harding Avenue and Country Club Road have been included in the paving project this construction season. These two roads were originally expected to be paved in the 2012-2013 paving season, but were delayed until the projects at University Park were completed. A majority of the funding of the paving comes from paving funds from the previous year, with approximately \$40,000 being needed from the contingency list for this year. As the University projects were initially discussed, the City Engineer agreed to hold off on paving the streets, which would have been damaged during construction, until the projects were complete. Although the streets were not a part of this year's paving list, funds from the previous paving year were expected to cover the cost. In order to be complete before the large influx of students into the newly developed housing units, paving was completed this past week. Streets on this year's contingency list will continue to be paved until funds are extinguished.

City Manager explained, that the paving list is never what is proposed and that the change orders are done all the time. He assured Council and citizens that there was no misappropriation of funds at all. He also noted that in his City Manager's Report, it should have said 2011-2012 Paving season and not 2012-2013. Councilor Nugent called for a point of order and questioned the City Manager on how Paving list was handled and questioned why it was done this way.

3. Airport Update

The City Manager gave an update on the Airport process on the Apron Project and then Glen Kelly, Assistant City Manager, added more detail to about the project for Council.

4. Fallfest Update

City Manager, Jeff Mikorski updated Council about the Fallfest weekend and stating that it was a busy weekend for Police and Fire, not as damaging as in the past but, the committee members think that it is from the work of the preplanning.

REPORT FROM CITY CLERK: No Report.

REPORT FROM CITY ATTORNEY: No Report.

REPORT FROM COUNCIL MEMBERS:

Councilor Bane:

Councilor Bane said that the weekend went well with the students and the clean-up and he stated that it would be great if they could also help clean up after Fall Fest also. He also noted that he did not appreciate how Council went into an Executive Session tonight, it sends the wrong message.

Deputy Mayor Kawecki:

Deputy Mayor Kawecki agreed with Councilor Bane in reference to the Executive Session that we must be vocal in all activities to the public and be above board. He noted that Council must state the reason for the Executive Session. He then announced that Saturday, August 22, 2015 starts the South Park super sale.

Councilor Nugent:

Councilor Nugent noted that there is speeding on Willowdale Road and requests police monitoring. He also requested traffic management on Jones Avenue and Willowdale Road. He referenced the work being delayed on University Avenue and requested discussion on issue on the next COW; by consensus Council agreed. He then reported a problem with (Blocking the Box) at intersections especially University, Fayette, and Beechurst needs to be addressed. He noted that for 3 quarters of a year he has requested a pedestrian signal on the western side of Beechurst and something needs to be done for the sake of the pedestrians. He then stated he was out of town last week and when he come back there was trash, where are we with Republic Services. We need a report, this is our provider, and we need to do more. This problem is

continuing. He also commended on the WVU students that volunteered prior to the Fallfest weekend.

Councilor Selin:

Councilor Selin also commended the freshman students for clean-ups, planting's, and painting. She then responded to comments made earlier made in the meeting that of accusations of bribery that the Council works with the citizens and that we are doing a good job. Councilor Selin appreciates the work on Beechurst and that it is now complete.

Councilor Redmond:

Councilor Redmond thanked the Norwood Neighborhood Association and the Jerome Park Neighborhood Association, the County Commission for the Ribbon Cutting of the new Hartman Run Bridge in Sabraton. He then commended the City Manager and the Assistant City Manager on receiving the WVML League Award. He then complemented Randy Jones on his efforts working with community service projects, he is obviously trying to change the culture at WVU. He also stated that going into the Executive Session the way that Council did is not a good thing. He also agreed with Councilor Nugent on his frustration on the traffic issues and blocking the box, texting, and speeding. He informed Council to be aware of boundaries of our City limits that near Southpoint will be a development happening off of Buckhannon.

Councilor Ganz:

Councilor Ganz wants to congratulate fellow Councilor Jay Redmond in opening the Mundy's Place Tavern on Madigan Avenue. Councilor Ganz announced that the Suncrest Neighborhood Association meeting will be held Thursday, August 27, 2015 at Calvary Baptist Church. Potluck dessert will be at 6:30 pm with a time to chat with neighbors and the meeting will start at 7:00 pm and various topics will be discussed. At the Suncrest picnic, concerns were expressed WVU Parking

Lots cut through of buses in residential community. Concerns were also expressed about lighting projecting into the community from the top of the medical building. FAA representative has asked the operators to maintain a safe height above residences, more information will be available in the near future. She then noted that neighbors have been concerned over the partying this past weekend. As part of my report I am attaching the Police and Fire Chief's reports to stop this activity from perpetuating. She then thanked WVU's college students and Service Learning students for the clean-up of Heritage Senior Community. Councilor Ganz requested her report be part of the record. **(Exhibit B)**

Mayor Shamberger:

Mayor Shamberger commented that she agreed on everyone's concerns and solutions for paving. She then responded to the litter and trash and requested citizens that when they drop something, pick it up. She also requested the City Manager to get a report from the Police Chief on citations. She then announced various meetings and events, Woodburn Neighborhood Association will be 8/21/2015 at 6:30 pm; Literacy Writing Workshop at the MAC will be 8/19/2015; Art of George Evans 8/19/2015; Evening with an Author at the Library 8/20/2015; Paint and Sip at Arts Mon 8/22/2015; Botanic Garden Wildflower Walk 8/22/2015 at 10:00 am; Dog Splash 8/23/2015; Jazz Festival 8/29/2015 Hazel Ruby Park at 2:30 pm; Meet your Neighbor at Farmers Market 8/30/2015 at 8:30 am; City Blood Drive 9/10/2015 at 11:30 am. She then commended all of the CTA Cheerleaders and thanked them for coming this evening.

ADJOURNMENT: There being no further items of business or discussion, the meeting adjourned by unanimous consent at 9:50 p.m.

James,
During your last visit to my office you asked a number of questions. I would like to answer a few of them in this letter.

You stated that the "Sober House" did not meet the Fire Department standards for a lodging and Rooming facility to include not having sprinkler system. After discussions with the Fire Marshall, Ken Tennant, it was confirmed that 206 Spruce Street fully complies with lodging and rooming requirements, inspections were performed in September and October of 2013 on the sprinkler system and fire alarm system.

You questioned if the construction on 200 Prairie Street of enclosing their roofed porch constitutes an expansion of a non-conforming use of the building because the residence is in a B-4 District. After conferring with City Attorney Ryan Simonton and Director of Development Services Chris Fletcher, the City finds that enclosing the area below a roofed porch area does not constitute the expansion of a non-conforming use. The roofed porch is considered a part of the single-family non-conforming use of the house. The porch area is not expanding in size therefore the non-conforming use is not expanding.



At the very well attended successful Suncrest Neighborhood Picnic, concerns were expressed about the WVU healthcare parking lots and cut-through of buses in the previously quiet residential community. Concerns were also expressed about the lighting projecting into the community from the top of medical buildings.

Helicopters from WVU healthcare have been flying low for months. Articles in the paper stated that it was due to temporary landing zones and construction. As it turns out there are at least 5 contractors operating these helicopters. A FAA representative has been in touch with them and asked the operators to maintain the safe height of 500 feet above residences. Further information will be available in the near future.

Neighbors have expressed concern over the partying perceived to occur this past weekend. The police Chief and Fire Marshall have released reports and I am confident that cooperation is taking place with WVU to stop this activity from perpetuating. I am looking forward to information to be shared with the community as to how overcrowding in the bars downtown, houses in the community will stop along with the underage and criminal activities that occurred. I am looking forward to hearing plans to stop the trashing of our streets and yards with beer cans, cigarette butts, cups etc. after the extreme partying. *May I enter Fire Marshall's police report into the minutes*
