Project: Commission and installation of an outdoor mural public artwork installation at the Woodburn Community Complex in Morgantown, WV.

Budget: \$10,000 (all-inclusive)

Call Issued: January 24, 2022

Entries Due: February 25, 2022

Project description:

City of Morgantown Arts & Cultural Development Department is seeking to commission an artist and/or artist's team to create a site-specific mural public artwork installation at the Woodburn Community Complex (formerly Woodburn Elementary School). The artwork will be the latest large-scale mural project of the Department of Arts & Cultural Development.

Community context:

Morgantown, West Virginia located in North Central West Virginia is home to West Virginia University. Founded in 1867, West Virginia University has a long and rich history as a land-grant university. In 1862, President Abraham Lincoln signed the Morrill Act, offering land grants of 30,000 acres of federally owned land to each state that agreed to establish a college to teach agriculture and the "mechanic arts" (engineering). The State of West Virginia was formed the following year and, shortly thereafter, the state's legislature accepted the terms for the Morrill Act to raise the money to start the new land-grant college they called the Agricultural College of West Virginia. Population for Morgantown, according to the 2019 census is 30,712 with an additional population nine months out of the year of 28-30,000 students.

Background:

The Department of Arts & Cultural Development will collaborate with the City of Morgantown, Morgantown Cultural Arts Commission, artists, and members of the community to award the commission. Morgantown has a long and celebrated history as a city that embraces and supports arts, culture, and history throughout the entire fabric of the community. The City of Morgantown recognizes the importance of arts and culture in economic and tourism development, quality of life, educational opportunity, and civic involvement.

In 2020, the City of Morgantown created the Department of Arts and Cultural Development to oversee, mobilize and support cultural resources on behalf of the entire community. Also, in 2020, the Morgantown City Council identified Arts and Culture as a strategic goal of the city.

The Arts and Cultural Development Department strives to enhance the vitality of Morgantown and the quality of life for all residents by supporting an environment where arts and cultural organizations thrive, artists and culture bearers are celebrated and supported, and people of all ages enjoy opportunities for expression and experiencing the arts.

The Department of Arts and Cultural Development promotes the value of arts and culture and works to ensure that a wide range of high-quality artistic experiences are available to everyone. We encourage artist-friendly arts and cultural policy and oversee City owned cultural facilities.

From the historic Metropolitan Theatre to the newly renovated Ruby Amphitheatre at Hazel Ruby McQuain Park, to the Morgantown History Museum, the City of Morgantown supports cultural programs and services of all kinds and for people of all ages.

Goals of the Morgantown Mural program:

The City of Morgantown wishes to support public art and murals to contribute to our quality of life, economic and tourism development, and to promote arts, culture, and history in nurturing the creative spirit and identity of Morgantown and the region. We respect and honor the diversity and history of our community in all its many facets, and we seek to provide access to a variety of artistic disciplines and practices that can appeal to this diverse constituency.

Site Description:

The site-specific public artwork installation will be installed at the Woodburn Community Complex located at 918 Fortney Street, Morgantown, WV 26508. The mural placement will be located on an exterior brick wall of the former cafeteria/gymnasium overlooking the former playground and ball field. The city is currently working with the Board of Parks and Recreation to design and install a new



playground and park as a revitalization effort in the Woodburn neighborhood. The Woodburn Community Complex is his home to the Mountaineer Homeschool HUB, Shack Neighborhood House, MT Pockets Theatre, Pop Shop, and the Friends of Deckers Creek. The site for this mural is an exterior brick wall approximately 32' wide by 18' high and the proposed artwork can be a portion or all of this surface.

Budget:

The budget for the commissioned project, which will be dedicated in summer 2022, is \$10,000, all-inclusive. The fee will include, but is not limited to artists/design fee, materials, installation, transportation, insurance, project documentation, travel, site modification, per diem expenses and contingency to cover unexpected expenses.

Artist Eligibility:

The call is open to all professional artists who are U.S. citizens and live and work in the United States. Artist teams will be considered, but only a single artist 'project manager' will be contracted. The artist's services will include design of an original artwork, management of installation of the work, and availability for a public reception, media interviews and other promotional opportunities.

The DACD plays a collaborative role with the public and its various constituencies – nonprofit arts organizations, artists, businesses, and developers. Since art is not an exact science, nor does it have specific local, state, or federal guidelines or requirements as might be applicable in other fields, it is important to understand that the development of an artwork is a process in which the DACD must weigh community interests alongside the artist's aesthetic considerations.

The collaborative process is an important one, as public art works do not exist in a vacuum, but in a larger community context. The artwork becomes a reflection of the community in which it is presented. A willingness to explore direction and outcome of the creation in a collaborative process will result in a project that is successful for both the artist and the community in which it exists.

The Woodburn Community Mural is desired to be a participatory project in which the chosen artist or artist team will work directly with youth and other community stakeholders in the design and implementation of the mural project. Artist applicants should discuss their experience in working with youth and community members in the creation and implementation of mural projects.

The City of Morgantown and the Department of Arts & Cultural Development is committed to equal opportunity and nondiscrimination in all programs and services and does not discriminate on the basis of race/ethnicity, color, religion, gender, marital status, national origin, ancestry, age, sexual orientation, disability, or veteran status. Applications may be submitted digitally, free of charge via email, google docs, or drop box to vkitch@morgantownwv.gov.

Deadline: Applications must be submitted by **February 28, 2022.**

Submitted material will consist of:

- Samples of Work - Six digital images (jpeg format preferred)
- Caption sheet identifying each image by title of artwork, medium, dimensions, dates, price (if applicable) and location. Image file names must correspond to the caption sheet.
- Resume / CV
- Three references (including full names, titles, affiliations, and contact information)
- Letter of interest (1-3 pages). Preference will be given to an expanded artist statement relating to this specific project.
- Statement on community engagement (required)
- Preliminary design ideas or concepts related to this specific project (optional)
- Up to three selections of representative printed materials, such as catalogues or news articles (optional).

Selection Process:

Selection of three finalists will be determined by a public art advisory committee consisting of a combination of the following:

- Member of Cultural Arts Commission
- Members of the community
- Artist(s)
- Public art expert(s)
- City staff

Incomplete application materials or artists who do not meet eligibility requirements will not be considered for finalist selection. A stipend of \$250 will be provided to each finalist for design, development of proposal, creation of presentation, and preparation of maintenance guidelines.

Criteria:

- Artwork must be the original work of the artist(s) without any historic, current, or future replications or editions.
- The artwork must be durable, low maintenance, appropriate for a pedestrian environment and able to withstand year-round Morgantown outdoor weather conditions.
- Creative license with diverse interpretations, including abstract focus, will be considered.
- Artist's qualifications and experience.
- Aesthetics – the artist's consideration of the context of the artwork in relation to the proposed site.

January 2022 - Call is issued
February 2022 - Application deadline
March 2022 - Finalists selected
April-May - Finalists create designs
May-June 2022 - Artist selected, art installation
